✓	Do carefully and regularly clean your contact lenses, as directed by your optometrist. Do store lenses in proper contact lens case, clean case after each use and let air dry, and replace every 3 months

✓	Do use fresh solution each time to clean contact lenses (never re-use solution).		
✓	Do follow the recommended contact lens replacement schedule prescribed by your optometrist.		
✓	Do remove contact lenses before swimming or entering a hot tub. Talk to Dr. Wittman about daily disposables.		
✓	Do completely avoid exposing your lenses to tap water to avoid blinding infections.		
✓	Do see you optometrist for your regularly scheduled contact lens and eye examination.		
✓	Do replace your contact lenses every	, at manufacturer's recommendation.
